

Four D20 pairs place in Philadelphia NAP

Gram, St. Thomas find Boise is the right place for them

If you played at a bridge tournament in western Oregon in the first 15 years of this century, there's a very good chance that John Gram was directing, and slightly less of a good chance that Suzanne St. Thomas was playing.

Gram has long been one of the ACBL's busiest tournament directors, averaging

almost 300 sessions at more than 25 tournaments a year.

Since the couple's 2015 move from Salem to Boise, though, the portion of his directing done in District 20 has been limited to sectionals in the three easternmost units and the four regionals, running all the morning sessions. Players he used to see regularly now tell Gram they

Balancing players' interests is a challenge

I remember, not *that* long ago, venturing to find ways to achieve different victories. out into tournament play and marveling at the fact that a bracket 1 KO paid over 40 points. Certainly that was more than I had ever won in a year, let alone one event! I wondered why the payout was so much larger than the other brackets.

It was explained to me that the payout was so high for bracket 1 because they were already there. Huh? They were, most likely, already flight A players with thousands of masterpoints, so you might as well pile them on. If you were to accelerate the masterpoint accumulation of a new player, they might find themselves ineligible for limited events, or even for placing in B or C in an open event. Can you imagine only playing in bracket

1, open pairs, or A/X Swiss from now on? I have to. Going over 2000 masterpoints makes me ineligible for flight B locally, and soon enough, going over 2500 will make me flight A for national events. Fortunately I have been "playing up" for some time now, getting knocked around in the big boy ring, so I'm resigned to it. I know that winning is a remote possibility, so I try

Beating a team that has more experience. Bridge is a pretty tough product to sell. Here, pay a bunch of money to sit around

all day and lose! At first I was

against all of the events designed to segregate players into their comfort zones. I think you learn more and faster when you play against better players, even if you have to lose for a while.

If you're only playing in 299er or Gold Rush pairs, how will you meet someone like Hendrik

Sharples or Jon Bartlett, two of the nicest guys who will, after crushing you into dust, kindly

smile and help you understand what the hell just happened?

I've had an about-face, and I encourage tournament organizers to give the customer what they want, as much as I continue to encourage new players to play up in open events too. It's hard to make it balance there may be fewer brackets in the KOs and open pairs may not have many tables. Jonathan Steinberg, a top player on the

circuit, wrote on Facebook about an experiment at the Raleigh regional. Because many teams prefer not to play against professional players, the ACBL is trying smaller top brackets; but attendance is still down. It's not just a local problem.

I'm not sure what makes a successful tournament schedule. Some were confused as to why there weren't KOs starting every day in Sunriver, forcing people who were knocked out to play pairs instead of continuing with their teammates in a new event. Maybe there should be more Gold Rush pairs, since that makes the payout for the open pairs higher, and they seem to attract lots of players.

Solutions are hard to come by, as are people who are willing to stick their neck out and make changes. The leadership at the ACBL is in flux, and our own district now welcomes a new president. We, as players and customers, need to be supportive of ideas and freely offer realistic suggestions. What do you like about the game? What gets you out to a regional? What makes you stay home? I know I'm listening, and I'm sure Laurie Rowe is too.

Why robots should be brought to justice

I still hate robots. The kind that play on BBO, anyway.

A year and a half ago I wrote about wanting to meet the BBO robot in a dark alley with a hammer. That hasn't changed.

My life has changed in a lot of other ways in the past three months, though. During the Spring NABC, I snuck away from my desk in the Daily Bulletin office long enough for two amazing experiences - a private concert for 80 people by the now-solo lead singer of my favorite band, and an internet celebrity's meet-and-greet at a trampoline park in Philadelphia.

In April, along with having two surgeries and getting catfished, I finally did something I'd been wanting to do for a long time and started writing fan fiction, a story about the guy I went to meet. It's been a long time since I tried writing for fun outside of journalism, and I missed it. Last month I managed to earn a Twitter follow from my


main character and bought a ticket to see him again in a few weeks.

All this has been exciting. Meanwhile. I still haven't been playing much bridge. I haven't played in a tournament since September, and when I finally made it to the club in late April, it was the first time I'd

the time required to continue working on the Trumpet and being away from all my Oregon partners makes it too hard to play much. Which is why I'm left with robots.

There are many reasons to hate them. Their bizarre leads are especially frustrating. Their penchant for passing takeout doubles and pulling penalty doubles is maddening — you can hover over the bid to confirm they know what you mean, and

they still do the opposite. Be-

seen them cuebid on a scattered 3-count.

side of the coin of their reluctance to balance. In situations where I could pass and trust a partner with a pulse to do something, I have to bid knowing my useless center-hand opponent won't. And so they feel compelled to "show" the meager values I've already discerned they have. But the problem, aside from the fact that we're probably already too high, is that I've bid two suits and I still don't know which one they're intending to support. Not a problem if you can rebid the lower suit and trust partner to take a preference, but that doesn't work with robots. To them, rebidding your second suit shows extra length, and they'll assume it's longer than your first suit, even though

you would have bid it first if it was.

So try rebidding your first suit? Nope, they still think you're longer in the second suit. Let's introduce exhibit A:

▲J 7 **♥**K Q 8 6 2 **♦**9 7 6 4 **♣**A 5.

The robot holds this hand, we're vulnerable and the auction has proceeded:

LHO	You (robot)	RHO	Human
Pass	Pass	Pass	1 🔶
1♠	Dbl	3♠	4♣
Pass	?		

Is a 4♦ preference so hard? If you really think your hand is too good for it — if you don't think two spade losers is a negative, or that wasted heart values opposite shortness is a negative — you could jump to 5♦. But no, exhibit B, you cuebid 4♠.

Knowing that if I rebid clubs there's no way to convince the robot I have longer diamonds, I decide to emphasize the suit I want to play in and bid 5. I hope I've shown 2=1=6=4.

Finally, exhibit C: the robot corrects to 6♣, because two-card support is better than four-card support. I suppose the robot thinks this is yet another cuebid in support of diamonds, the suit it hasn't actually supported yet, but I certainly wasn't looking for seven. Not with two spade losers, and not opposite a passed hand.

If you really think the hand you've overstated once is too good to pass 5, a raise to $6 \blacklozenge$ avoids the ambiguity of $6 \clubsuit$, which sounds like a preference with 2=5=1=5. Down two is better than down five.

We had Idahoans playing with Oregonians and Washingtonians. We didn't have any all Californian, Idahoan or Washingtonian teams. Well maybe next year.

We had venues at bridge clubs in Boise, Portland and Vancouver. The bridge experience of all our members' districtwide is enhanced by the willingness of these clubs to open their facilities to our online play. I appreciated their willingness to help out.

We had venues that I refer to as "bridge parties" at private homes in Malibu and Penn Valley, Calif.; Honolulu; Boise; and Portland and Seaside, Ore. I am especially fond of these bridge parties. Laws of the Game Don't finger bidding box

If you're like most people, you find *hovering* off-putting — hovering over your shoulder while you're on the computer, writing, on the phone, etc.

The kind of hovering you see at the bridge table can be just as annoying, but it also can have consequences. It's when a player reaches for a card in the bidding box, then hesitates with his hand over the box,

eventually bidding or passing. It's not good practice and can be a violation of law.

Dan Voorhies, a prominent southern Oregon bridge player in his time, always chastised players not to reach

for the bidding box before they had decided what card to remove. This was very good advice, for two reasons.

First, it's poor etiquette and can annoy your colleagues at the table. More importantly, you may expose yourself to a penalty if you first touch or start to remove one card, then change your mind and remove a different card or pass. Why? Because it can give unauthorized information (UI) to your partner.

For example, suppose you start to reach for a suit bid card, hesitate, then pass instead. You've certainly sent a message to your partner that your hand is on the border between bidding and not. Or suppose you start to pull out the pass card, only to replace it with the 1♠ card. You've suggested to your partner that you have a very minimum hand. Your partner has received UI in both cases.

Just holding your hand over the bidding box without indicating what card you might choose, then pulling out a bid, does not warrant a penalty. You've raised expectations (and acted somewhat thoughtlessly), but haven't imparted any information to your partner. However, if you hesitate over the box, and then pass, your indecision imparts UI and a director call is appropriate. An adjusted score may be in order.

What about a mechanical error (i.e., a careless mistake), such as

Playing up helps pair finish second in NAP C

Roger Thomas and I represented District 20 at the 2018 North American Pairs Flight C championships. Armed with handy puns and pairs of shorts (Roger), we made the long flight to snowy Philadelphia for the 2018 NABC, ready and eager to challenge ourselves and see how well our training held up against top competition.

Our philosophy has been to "play up" for most of the year, learn as much as we could from that, and then go for a result in the NAP, or the Grand National Teams (should we qualify for them).

Playing up exposes more of our weaknesses, and clues us in on how more advanced players bid and play hands. In order to learn from our mistakes, we go over the problematic hands after each session. Periodically, we ask more experienced players how they would have bid or played a hand. We are fortunate to have a supportive group in Portland who are willing to help fellow bridge players improve.

At our first NABC in Toronto last summer, we played in several open events, and became acutely aware of how strong they are at that level. We'd never worked so hard to average a 40%! We left with stories of playing against top pros, and with a context for our playing level.

In Philadelphia this year, we were excited to play top-level competition in North American events such as the Lebhar IMP Pairs and the Silodor Pairs, as well as regional open events. We improved our open results average to a 44%. Progress! In Philadelphia, we brushed shoulders with some pros. Our contingency plan for improving our play was to integrate the DNA of top players. We would collect DNA samples through shaking hands with the likes of David Bakshi or Eric Rodwell, and culture these tissue samples. If the turnaround time on the cultures was fast enough, we would have started a cultural revolution.

I was nervous to face a California pair for the first boards of the NAP. California crushed the Toronto GNTs. Fortunately, our first boards went well. As a result of playing stronger competition in open events throughout the year, we were then able to relax, focus and play confidently against our peers.

Our bridge learning depends, in part, on guidance from stronger Portland area players. Here is a "learning" hand from the third round:

None vulnerable, East passed, South opened 1. As West, I held:

♠Q 10 7 4 3 ♥9 6 2 ♦A 7 4 3 ♣7

pulling out the wrong bid card? No penalties are appropriate when a player catches the mistake and promptly plays the correct card instead. The test: whether the error was corrected *without pause for thought*. (Law 25A.) Even if LHO has quickly passed, the error may be corrected.

So what should you do if an opponent hovers over the bidding box before making a call? If he makes a bid, do nothing. After the hand, you can gently remind him that it's a breach of protocol to hover, but don't make a big deal about it, especially if it's a less experienced player.

If he winds up passing after hovering over bid cards, call the director, say what happened and advise her that you may want her to take a second look at the hand after it is played if you feel that UI has been used. Now you've sent a message to the careless player's partner and protected your side from being victims of UI.



When I bid 4, I thought I will call it a law of total tricks bid if he gets upset. In the end, I didn't have much defense, so I passed.

Partner leads the A and this dummy goes down:

As I'm looking at it, I wished he had led low from his ace so that I could lead a heart through declarer. Next he leads the ♣7, 10 from the dummy. What would you do? I dutifully covered an honor with an honor, playing my queen, taken by the ace.

Declarer collected the AQ and laid down the **&**K. She collected my last diamond by playing small to the king in the dummy, ran the clubs from the top and made six. And my partner went off in a huff. I was in the dark about what mistake I had made.

Can you figure out what the mistake was? Is this contract makeable if Sherry does not help declarer?

With my partner's pass, N–S had a chance of finding a game contract. Just how likely was that? I wondered how likely it was that a Flight C pair had a penalty double in their arsenal if I bid? We stood to get a good board if we were left in 2♠ undoubled, or if our opponents didn't find the appropriate level and contract strain. I decided to be a thorn and bid $2 \bigstar$.

Curious as to how our local Portland bridge experts would evaluate this hand, I sought their input. Here are some thoughts based on their feedback:

Up to this point, we had had success against the field playing and defending "normal" contracts.

Much of the field would pass this hand. We didn't need to seek exotic contracts like 2♠ to do well. Besides, the A was one defensive trick, and game might not be a slam dunk for our opponents.

Overcalling 2♠ also described my shape and strength to our opponents, and this could guide them in their play. Sometimes it is hard to accept the power of the pass card.

Portland bridge players, your voices are in our heads, hopefully guiding us to more informed bridge decisions. It is through playing up and being deliberate in learning from our mistakes, asking lots of questions and putting in the time to analyze the hands, that we have been able to improve our bridge game. Thank you.



The Bidding Toolbox How to find the right slam holding a void

Finding slam with a void in hand can be problematical when your only tool for asking about controls or key cards is a form of Blackwood.

Take this hand, for instance, which occurred in a sectional pairs game a few years ago:



When South opened 1♠, North knew he wanted to be in slam. He just wasn't sure whether it belonged in six or seven.

A form of Key Card Blackwood was used by most pairs in the field. After South's answer of $5 \forall$ (two key cards without the queen of trumps), North was still unsure. If South's two key cards are the ♠AK, seven is cold. If one of the key cards is the ♥A, only six can be made. And if the two key cards are the $\bigstar K$ and $\forall A$, and the spades are split 3-0 with A-J-10 in the wrong hand, declarer can

make only five. Blackwood can be a useless tool when

asker has a void. But there are other ways to get more specific information.

Exclusionary Key Card Blackwood is one way to approach the problem. Jumping to your void over game level implies a fit

for partner and asks for key cards without respect to the suit you jumped to. In this hand, a bid of $5 \forall$ asks partner to show key cards without respect to hearts, using the usual steps. A response by South of 6♣ shows two key cards

without the queen (the first two steps, 5♠ and 5NT, are 1430 or 3014, depending on your system). Because South is instructed to ignore hearts with his answer, North knows the two key cards are the A K and

confidently bids the grand slam. In a hand like this, some partnerships prefer to use Jacoby 2NT first to establish the fit, then use Exclusionary Key Card by jumping to the void suit (but still, over game level). It's less likely to lead to a mis-

understanding.

Another way to find the right level is the 5NT Grand Slam Force convention. Over South's opening bid of 1♠, North bids 5NT, which asks South to bid grand slam if he has two of the top three spade honors, or bid six with only one of the them. Again, the pair reaches the grand slam because South, indeed, has two of the top three spades.

Those in the field who had only Key Card Blackwood in their toolboxes, bid only six, unsure of South's exact holding, and suffered in the matchpoint scoring.

If South had opened with spades headed by the J-10 and hearts headed by the A-K-Q, you could chalk it up to bad luck. But since South has values for his opening bid, he could pass 5NT if he has no key cards outside the heart suit and

hope for the best.

Discuss with your partner ways to handle slam interest hands when you hold a void. It might help you gain a better result.

You can count the clubs: seven in dummy, three in your hand, one from partner. That leaves declarer with the A-K tight. So you don't play the honor.

If you do not cover, he cannot pull trump and run clubs, as there are not enough entries to dummy.

No one was allowed to play in the $4 \bigstar$ game. Sherry made a nice 44 bid, and it is a law bid — but that is another article.

PHILADELPHIA JPRING NABC

District 20 players take fifth in NAP B and sixth in 10K Swiss

Each time I attend an NABC, I return armed with knowledge on how to improve for the next time, be it bridge related or not.

Traveling is always a bit of an ordeal, whether flying or driving, especially in late winter or early spring. Just ask Chip. Although I always say I think these tournaments should be held somewhere easily accessible and cheap, like Nebraska, it is fun to go to a big city and have the opportunity to sight-see and try out new restaurants, shopping or whatever.

The drawback when you're somewhere like Philadelphia is the host hotel and surrounding hotels can be expensive. I have stayed with friends, at the host hotel, and at Airbnbs various distances from the playing site to try to save money and now I can definitely say that I think it's best to be within a 10-15 minute walk. I also prefer the Airbnb experience, because having your own kitchen can ensure eating better meals for less money.

My partner Paul Wrigley and I decided to warm up for the NAP Flight B with the 10K Swiss, held Friday and Saturday. We teamed up with **Tim Rilling** and **Don Herring**, who were also playing in the NAP event.

Friday was a two-session qualifier with half the field qualifying for the second day.

My goal with these types of events is to qualify for the second day and go from there.

We all played quite well the first day, losing only two matches by 1 and 9 IMPs and tying one match. Four of our five wins were pretty solid, so we found ourselves qualifying in fifth place for day two. Not bad.

We started out the second day with four wins and were sitting second with four rounds to go. Time for the dinner break.

Across from the playing site is the Reading Terminal Market, a giant indoor marketplace with all kinds of vendors. My friend and I ate at Beck's, a Cajun-themed place with a signature sandwich called The Trainwreck, which is like a Philly cheesesteak but Louisiana style. It con-

sists of steak, salami, andouille sausage, American cheese and creole mayonnaise on a roll. It is 100 percent more meat, cheese and bread than my normal diet.

The sandwich was aptly named as my bridge the next two rounds was a hot mess. I'm not really saying my dinner was to blame, but in a general sense when you're on the road — sleeping in a strange place, on a different schedule, eating out - it's a lot to ask of yourself to do well at bridge. You need to take care of yourself. Would I have played better had I eaten a salad? I'll never know. Are there world champion bridge players who smoke cigarettes, eat at McDonald's and close the bar after the evening session? Sure. So maybe it's about knowing what's best for yourself.


We recovered, somewhat, and finished sixth overall. Still not bad. I think we were all fairly pleased. As Paul said, "It was an enjoyable event, with great opposition. We played the winning team twice. Intense two days."

Next up was the event which we had come all this way for.

I personally love the North American events. It's guaranteed you're going to play people from all around the country. Most are friendly and welcoming, and you know what you're up against in terms of skill. Sure, there's a wide range in flights B and C, but you can be fairly certain you aren't

running into Meckwell unless you're playing in flight A. Maybe I'll get to write about that one day.

Paul and I had three average sessions and were something like 23rd going into the final. Honestly, I had all but written us off since a few pairs had posted 60+% games. But although that was true, they had roller-coastered and had below average results, too. At least we were consistent. It was a mistake to think there wasn't a chance to win, and in fact, had I done better on this board we would have won.



Sitting North, I dealt and passed. My LHO opened 3♣ and Paul doubled. My RHO, after some thought, bid 5♣. It's my call. I could double, pass, or bid 5♠.



A Bronze Life Master, Denneau has been playing bridge for about 30 years, the last 14 of which have been in Hawaii. Denneau actually spent his early childhood on the island, where his dad was in the Navy. Denneau mostly grew up in Tucson, where the family moved when his dad retired. Denneau worked there for many years as a software engineer and consultant.

In 2003 he was drawn back to Hawaii for a job on an astronomy project at the University of Hawaii, where he remains today.

"I loved astronomy as a kid, so this was a chance to scratch an old childhood itch and try something new," Denneau says. He is now leading a telescope project called ATLAS that looks for hazardous asteroids.

And while he's only played in four or five NABC tournaments over the years, he's especially excited about attending one in his hometown.

"Hawaii is a real melting pot of cultures. It's a fascinating mix of different people

and food and languages," Denneau says. So what should you know before you visit? First, understand the lifestyle, which Denneau describes as "fiercely easygoing."

"The Aloha Spirit is a real thing — be kind and respectful to others," he says. "People here love also food and celebrations, and when you are guest of honor for any kind of event, the aloha shirts and leis really make you feel special."

Denneau points up the potential for non-bridge-playing companions. "They can relax or explore the island while you're playing bridge," he says.

"As a visitor, it's worth it to get away from the highly commercial areas to get off the beaten path and check out other parts of the island," he explains. "There are amazing finds all over the island — art, food, beautiful landscapes, hula - and it will be less expensive and more laid back than what you find in Waikiki."

And maybe the best reason of all to venture to the Hawaii NABC, in Denneau's opinion, is to help the Hawaiian bridge

community thrive.

"We know that it can be difficult and expensive to get to Hawaii, but this year our organizing committee is working really hard to bring the hospitality for this

Perhaps the only downfall of attending the Hawaii NABC is potential distractions, Dennau says. "We joke that we pray for rain during our tournaments so that the bridge players stay inside to play."

Bridge blast from the past

As 'Ask John' ends, Ashton shares'66 moment of fame

While recently looking in our attic for something else, Marie found a Sept. 19, 1966, article from The Indianapolis News written by Easley Blackwood - yes, the author of the ace-asking convention.

It featured a hand played by my mother and me in an inter-city match against Cincinnati. It demonstrates some of the differences in bidding between then and now. Here is Blackwood's article:

* * * * * * * * *

In some quarters the Indianapolis team was given a poor chance of defeating the powerful Cincinnati team in a match played there last month. On the basis of masterpoints held, they outranked our players by a wide margin.

Overlooked was the fact that the Indianapolis team had won the right to play the hard way, by competing against tough competition over 112 hands played at the Blackwood Bridge Center. The Cincinnati team was hand-picked according to their reputation.

Our team won by the overwhelming score of 110 IMPs. We took the lead on the very first hand and the issue was never in doubt. Indianapolis adopted the "bid 'em up" style which is so effective at IMPs.

In 2018, a majority of players would open the West hand because of the favorable vulnerability, adequate defense and hearts as a second suit. A Michaels cuebid, showing hearts and an unknown minor, would be the popular choice after an opponent's 1♠ opening.

My 2NT was mid-'60s standard, albeit a little light, showing an opening hand with stoppers, as Jacoby 2NT was in its infancy. Believe it or not, 3♥ over partner's 1♥ would have been the forcing raise.

My leap to slam was a demonstration of youthful exuberance, a condition that, trust me, is in short supply today. Leave it to Mom to hold the perfect hand!



What would happen if I passed and heard Paul double again? I have one defensive trick, is that enough? Are my five spades a huge liability on defense? I thought so. I decided to bid $5 \bigstar$ and was down one for 5.5 matchpoints and a 22%board. This was against the pair who won the event.

Many N/S pairs were allowed to play 4♠, indicating that either East didn't preempt or West didn't raise. Either way, they made a good bid against us.

The winning pair beat us by 11.5 matchpoints on a 25 top. Had I doubled 5 \clubsuit and set it three for plus 500, a top, we would have won the event.

It's hard to think you can play 104 boards and it all comes down to one or two. But that's not true, of course. It's every board that matters, and every card. The one or two that you'll replay and relive over and over again for the rest of your life do matter, but mostly because they will help you do better next time.

New recruiting bonus benefits teachers

When was the last time the ACBL sent you a check for \$500? Oh, never? That's because you haven't signed up 100 new ACBL members. Unfortunately, most of us live in smallish units where such a thing is impossible.

It wasn't always like this. Years ago, the ACBL used to send me a nice thank you letter whenever I signed up six new members, listing their names, together with a check for \$36. And it wasn't the money that was important, it was the recognition, the names, the thank you that warmed my heart.

Teaching beginners is brutally hard work from the get-go. First you have to lay out a lot of your own cash for newspaper advertisements (\$600 for my last class). This is eventually reimbursed: 50% by ACBL (it used to be 75%) and 50% by my own Seaside unit, but only after several months and submissions of invoices, forms and tear sheets. Then you also need to design and print flyers. You trudge around putting them up in coffee shops, restaurants, supermarkets and on community bulletin boards. You beg at clubs for players to spread the word.

You follow up on phone calls, answer questions, send out email reminders. Your venue may require rent or deposits, you need to prepare lesson materials and hands, provide coffee and snacks, and get tables and equipment set up. Some of your students may decide bridge is not for them, some only want to play party bridge, and some may try duplicate and drop out. Fortunately, many end up as regular players and new friends who are a constant source of pride and inspiration for the next beginner course.

The good news is that now the ACBL has come up with a win-win proposition for ACBL accredited teachers and students. It is offering a one-month temporary membership for \$7.99, and a \$5 signup bonus to the teacher or club manager. In exchange, the newbie gets an ACBL number, the new member package, the Bridge Bulletin and their masterpoints recorded.

Full membership is now \$49 (yikes, in 2016 it was \$29 for new members) and a temporary member can, within the month, sign up online for full membership, and their original payment of \$7.99 will be credited to them.

Now I am very happy to promote trial memberships. Before, I was never comfortable when a full membership was required. The new player was not familiar with the organizational side of bridge, the outlay was so much greater, and - dare I say it there was nothing in it for me.

Some nuts and bolts: Membership forms can be downloaded and printed from acbl.org and they include the \$7.99 trial option. These can be mailed in with a check. Or a new player can sign up for temporary membership online with a credit card. In both cases, the sign-up within a month for full membership must be online for the \$7.99 credit to be automatically effective.

Another big change from ACBL and an added incentive to join, is that without a

player number - from temporary, permanent or lapsed membership - you can no longer play in an ACBL sectional, regional or NABC. At the very least you will have to sign up for the one-month membership for \$7.99. (If you are a lapsed ACBL member, vou pay \$4 extra per session.)

In the past, since we don't live in big metropolitan areas (or haven't teamed up with other teachers to share the \$500), we in our district have been the unsung, unpaid ACBL work force. Who else creates new members for ACBL?

I feel thanks are due to Bob Heller, 2017 ACBL president, to whom I relayed this gripe of mine at the Seaside Regional teachers' breakfast, and others in ACBL leadership who recognize the contribution of bridge teachers.

At the end of the day, we teach not for the money or the recognition but for the love of the game. Psychic rewards are the best, but a bit of cash is nice, too.



John Ashton's column has been a pillar of the Trumpet since it began 13 years ago. This issue we say goodbye to it with a couple of our favorite items from it.



Dear John,

With a void in opener's suit and a seven-card suit to run to, West made a light double to keep her four spades in the picture. This backfired when the opponents reached game. Partner, holding five trumps opposite an ostensible opening hand, doubled. Declarer had little trouble making an overtrick. If 690 wasn't already a bottom, than 800 or worse in 5♣ surely is, so there was no point in pulling the double. Did West have a better option to show her shapely hand? —In Too Deep (July/Aug. 2014)

Dear Try Wading,

Welcome to this week's episode of "Do you have a vulnerable takeout double of **1♥**?" We pose the questions and see how your example compares with the Bo Derek of doubles.

Do you have opening bid values? BUZZ! These 8 HCP would not persuade Vladimir Putin to open the bidding. Do you have adequate spades? Ding, ding. Four to the ♠K10 should please partner if he chooses to compete. Do you have the expected defensive potential? BUZZ! Partner has the right to expect at least two quick tricks from a vulnerable double.

Do you have the optimum length in hearts? BUZZ! Despite the murmur from the studio audience, it is usually better to have a singleton in the opponents' suit. This may seem counterintuitive, but it is one less trump that they have and may be used on defense either to lessen ruffing potential or to protect partner from a late endplay.

Are you comfortable if partner bids your weak suit? BUZZ! Correcting diamonds to clubs would show a much stronger hand with a more muscular suit. The $3\clubsuit$ bid in the auction given seems to be from the dark side of the moon. West was off the hook when South rebid $2 \checkmark$. Um, excuse us for a moment as we remove the homeless man, who lost his personal fortune playing rubber bridge, from our audience after his vociferous protest to our scoring. See you next week!
