Rowe wins board seat

Laurie Rowe was elected to represent District 20 on the ACBL board of directors, defeating Merlin Vilhauer, who has served on the board for nine years. Rowe, who is currently district president, will be leaving that role about two months after her term begins in January.

"I'm excited and looking forward to representing District 20 at the board meeting," Rowe said. As district president, Rowe fo-

cused on budget matters, appointing committees to examine ways to reduce expenses and increase revenue. She plans to bring that focus to the ACBL board.

Mark Tolliver moves to South America

The Portland area said goodbye – at least for a while – to one of District 20's top bridge players when Mark Tolliver moved to Colombia in November.

Soon after arriving in Portland in

1985, Tolliver established his partnership with Marc Zwerling. They were second in the 1991 Blue Ribbon Pairs, and in 2015 they represented the USA in the world championships, placing fourth in the senior teams. They've been on District 20's GNT Championship Flight team 13 times since 1997, most recently this year.

But Tolliver has been playing less in recent years in preparation for the big move to another continent.

It was at the world championships in 2014 (Sanya, China) and 2015 (Chennai, India) that Tolliver's interest in South America was sparked.

Seaside holds the 7 spot

Table count is 2,541

The newly remodeled convention center in Seaside was just finished in time for D20's most popular regional in October.

The space was more or less the same, but improvements were plentiful. Most noticeably, the restrooms were moved, allowing the east side of the building to be opened up. The stairs were updated and the area was airy and well-lit. Selling entries in the hallway made for awkward traffic patterns.

Down just 4.5%, the regional held steady as the seventh largest in North America with 2,541 tables. Ahead were the usual suspects (Gatlinburg, Palm Springs, Penticton, Houston and Sarasota) plus Charlotte, which gained 4%. The other annual regionals in the top 10 dropped an average of 6.5% (See chart, page 11).

The schedule was packed with multiple events that were somewhat difficult to locate, but once everyone got the hang of where things were it all worked out.

Bridge faces customer service challenge

This issue marks the end of the fourth year I've been on the Trumpet staff. The Oregon Trail Regional in February of 2016 was my first district board meeting. It's been very interesting to attend the meetings and listen to the reasons why certain decisions are made or not made.

I've developed more of an understanding of the board and its role and I'm grateful for that. I think that, thanks to this newspaper, there is trans-

parency and a means of communication for the constituents of the district.

It's also the most expensive thing in the budget, and newspapers everywhere aren't exactly flourishing. We emailed a link to the last issue and many were surprised to see it online, where it actually has been for some time via the district website. Yes, we've had one of those for a long time too.

I always feel a little defensive during the meetings when the budget is discussed and we examine The Trumpet and its costs. I would be sad to see the print format go away. Most of the bridge players do have smart phones now and home computers but there is still a disconnect with electronic communication. It's also nice to have a paper to read at tournaments when you aren't supposed to have your phone out in view.

In the last four years, some things have

changed while much has stayed the same. There are many intelligent, hardworking volunteers who are keeping bridge, and bridge tournaments, alive. The board is not burying its head in the sand and plunging ahead, ignoring the financial warning signs: an aging bridge population, rising expenses, logistical issues.

The ACBL and, correspondingly, the board and local clubs, are basically cus-

tomer service endeavors. My employment background is in the hospitality industry, which also is customer-service driven. I often notice the similarities. The bridge clubs do an amazing job of creating a welcoming, nurturing space for all players. ACBL president **Russ Jones** referred to clubs as "the front door" of the ACBL. Help keep your local club going strong.

How do we keep all of the customers satisfied at the tournaments? Some of you want to play morning/afternoon games. Some of you like the afternoon/evening format. There are pair and team events, and at a big tournament there could be as many as four or five separate pair games going on.

The horror of having to make decisions

One day at ACBL headquarters they were filming some videos for bridge marketing. They needed several extras to appear in some background footage, and a call was put out for volunteers.

My first thought was to question whether any leading roles were available in this picture. Why should I be an extra when I can be a star?

But alas the videos were focused on interviews with new players. And while I sometimes act like one — like the other

day when I went down two in a cold 4♥ — I was unqualified. So reluctantly I agreed to be an extra.

The extras were supposed to sit at tables and *appear* to be playing bridge. While the handful of bridge players in the building were encouraged to participate, so were the majority of employees who don't play. They suggested we just throw cards in no real organized fashion, because the target audience — people who have no knowledge of the game — would never know the difference.

I was seated at a table with an expert, a novice who rarely plays but is quite competent and a complete newbie who had no inkling of anything related to bridge, who would be my partner. I deal first and this is my hand:

◆9 **▼**4 2 **◆**K J 9 7 6 5 3 **♣**Q 10 6.

I open 3♦ and LHO, the expert, overcalls 3NT, which is passed out. My partner was advised to lead a diamond, and her reaction made clear she didn't have any. So she led the ♣2. This was dummy:

 $\clubsuit A \ Q \ 8 \ 3 \ 2 \quad \blacktriangledown K \ 9 \ 7 \ 6 \quad \blacklozenge 10 \ 8 \quad \clubsuit 8 \ 4.$

I put up the ♣Q and am surprised when it holds — and even more surprised to see that declarer has dropped the ♣J under it. Why in the world would he do that?

When I return the ♣10, declarer discards a diamond. My partner has seven clubs! And she led a seventh-best ♣2! The ♣10 holds and I continue with the ♣6, hoping my partner realizes she needs to overtake it. She does, with the ♣9.

She then stares at her hand in agony

and eventually pulls out the ♣7, looking around the table in bewilderment as no one is able to follow suit. She then waits. "You're on lead," declarer reminds her. "And you're going to be as long as you keep leading clubs," I helpfully added.

To think, your very first hand of bridge, you've never had even a preface of a lesson, and you find the lead that sets 3NT down three! How wonderful it must be to hold all those cashing tricks. Easy game!

I thought there was no other possible in-

terpretation of my comment other than "cash your last three clubs." Alas, what my partner instead heard was, "You can end this torture of having to choose which card to lead next by playing something other than a club." So she led a heart. Declarer, grumbling that he should have been in 64, took the rest of the tricks — making three.

It was a shocking glimpse of how things look from someone else's perspective. Imagine think-

ing conceding a contract that had no play was easier than deciding what order to play the $A \times 5!$

We really don't know what goes on in the minds of our new players. At least I sure don't.

I've been giving lessons to another brand-new player, a friend in New York, over the phone on BBO. At the start of every hand, I ask him to tell his shape and count his high-card points. He gets the shape right but without fail miscounts his points. He's almost always one off, occasionally more. It was at least a dozen hands before he got one right.

IBPA awards

You've probably never heard of it, but there's an organization called the International Bridge Press Association. They have annual awards.

I think it would be terrific if there was an organization dedicated to recognizing all the kinds of quality journalism that bridge publications produce. Looking back on what we published in 2018, if there was an award for feature writing, I'd nominate our story on couples who play

together. If there was an award for newswriting, I'd nominate our story on the Carr fire. If there was an award for humor writing ... as much as I'd love to think I had something to contribute, I would certainly hope David Bird took first through 12th place with each month's installment of "Bridge with the Abbot."

Sadly, that isn't what the IBPA does. They recognize one kind of bridge writing — reports on hands played at tournaments. And the awards aren't really for the writers. They're mainly for players, to encourage them to tell us writers about the interesting hands they played, about which we'd never know. The categories are best declarer play, best defense, best bid hand, and best play by a junior.

Although there is an art to writing about how hands are played, what sets apart the articles that get considered for these awards has nothing to do with how they're written. It's all about what the players did.

An auction diagram that was published last fall in Honolulu, where I was one of the Daily Bulletin editors, was the winner of the best bid hand of the year award. And I, despite having at best marginal involvement with making sure the diagram appeared correctly on the page, was designated as the "author." Because someone had to be.

I was invited to go to the Hainan Bridge Festival in Sanya, China, coinciding with the Seaside Regional, to accept the award.

Those who are familiar with my, ahem, troubles with domestic travel immediately would be on high alert. Clearly no good could come from my boarding a plane headed to the other side of the world. It was a fiasco of epic proportions in the making. I was certain disaster would unfold, but there was a catch: You have to appear in person to accept the prize. So, I booked a ticket from Memphis to Detroit to Beijing to Sanya.

I made it as far as Detroit. Wiser heads prevailed and allowed me and my insufficient documents to go no further, and for that I thank them. Missing out on the prize was costly. But avoiding certain doom, priceless.



Eleven pairs qualify for Columbus

Recent D20 NAP finals fielded 38 pairs, one more table than last year, with 18 in A and 10 each in B and C.

Winning pairs are listed in the box at right.

The online finals were held in October at sites in all five of the states in the district, with contestants playing in Bend, Boise, Eugene, Honolulu, Nevada City, Portland, Roseburg, Seaside, Sparks and Vancouver.

The tournament was run by Mike Weber, who is so good at running online BBO events that the ACBL uses him to run its online intercollegiate championships.

After a hiccup or two on the first round as late and misnamed players were accounted for, the events ran

15 in C. The ACBL subsidizes participation in the NABC, paying \$700 to each of the first place players and \$350 to every second place player. D20 adds \$50 for second, \$250 for third and \$150 for fourth place. Because the finals are online, players can play from their home areas.

We should have more players playing. About seven years ago, the district de-

cided to move the finals online because face-to-face participation was dropping. The district felt that contesting North American events online, travel time and money could be saved.

This year there were 12 venues where players competed online in NAP finals. Players from other areas have inquired about playing. D20 is looking for venues at clubs or players' homes in Hilo, Newport, Redding or Albany-Corvallis. If you're interested, contact me at my email address below.

Qualifying for next spring's GNT is underway. Clubs can hold qualifying games through the end of February. If you need help finding partners or teammates or venues, please email me. There are four brackets, each with opportunities to represent D20 in the Montreal NABC. There will be training sessions on how to use the new and improved BBO site at most of the D20 regionals. A new way to count masterpoints

All masterpoints are not equal, and the ACBL bridge rating system could better reflect this. I offered this revision some years ago, got no response, still think it could be useful. A "tournament masterpoint" ranking could be added to ACBL player data, calculated according to the following formula:

(4G + 3R + 2S + B)/100 = TMP

(G = gold, etc.), and used for stratifying and bracketing at tournaments. I bet it would increase attendance among seniors, and B and C players, by not overmatching them so much, and thus giving them a better chance to earn more masterpoints.

Regionals need early start times

Q: Why is attendance at regionals dropping? A: Our bridge demographic is aging and more and more of us each year don't want to play at night. I circulated an email earlier this year to various folks in District 20 suggesting that we move to a morning/afternoon schedule for the primary events. The responses I received ran 4:1 in favor of moving to the earlier schedule.

I've voted with my feet: I played at Eugene in 2015 and 2017 but not this year; I played at Seaside in 2012, 2014, 2015, and 2016 but not since then. I played at Sunriver in 2014 and 2016 but not since. I played at Sacramento in 2015, 2016 and 2017 but not since.

So maybe I've just stopped playing regionals altogether? Nope. This year, I will have played at Riverside, Tucson, Medford and Palm Springs. That's right; I'll take two flights (and spend several hundred dollars more) to get to a venue in another state that features morning and afternoon sessions, but I won't drive even three hours to Eugene or Bend (let alone five hours to Vancouver or Seaside) where my mornings are wasted, I can't enjoy a relaxed dinner with friends (and wine!), and I don't get to bed before 11, still hyped up from the competition and unable to get to sleep before midnight without meds.

Play of the Hand

Listen and count tricks

When the opponents open strong, it's often a good idea to get in the way if you can to take up valuable bidding room, hoping to prevent them from finding the right contract. At favorable vulnerability, the risk versus gain ratio is more in your favor.

In this club game, East, white against red, decided to jam the bidding with a preemptive 3♦ call with her shapely 6-5-2-0

hand. South's 3♥ bid was game forcing, and West continued the interference with 4♦.

North, with great hearts, bid game, but East was not finished, bidding diamonds at the five level. South passes it around to North, who bid 5♥.


Now South has heard enough and bids the slam.

So, what is his thinking?

North shows 15 to 17 points with his opening bid, but he probably has the max since he opted to bid at the five level instead of doubling. North actually had 18 HCP, but ignored the ◆J and opened 1NT.

OK, so North has the max. Where are North's points? Not in diamonds, for sure. With no diamond points, North has to have the ♣A (4), the ♥KQ (5), and at least the ♠AK (7) to bring his total to 16. The ♥J would be a bonus, but with the implied 5–4 fit, it might not be needed. If North has the top three spades and is missing the ♥K, it puts his HCP at minimum. He can't be missing the ♣A for the same reason.

By realizing what North doesn't have (diamond points), South can pretty much



determine what North does have. And it's enough for slam. South knows this because he can count to 13: six club tricks, five heart tricks, and two spade tricks equal 13 tricks if they don't take their diamond trick (South's diamond loser goes on the good spade). If they take their diamond, which is likely, that's still 12 tricks.

West could have jammed the opponents even more by bidding 5♦ at his first turn. Even then, North is sure to bid 5♥ with his holding. South makes the same conclusions and bids the slam confidently.

Defending against diamonds, North/ South can take two spades, a spade ruff, and two clubs. It turns out 7♦ is a good sac.

If you know how many points your partner has, you can often figure out where they are by looking at your own hand and listening to the bidding. Then take off your socks and start counting tricks.



And while S4KS is not the sole reason for improving the graduation rate, school counselors feel they have been a major contributor.

"When a child can attend school and not be embarrassed by their clothing, they tend to feel that they belong and have an improved attitude about school," Green

"It comes in all sizes, so it fits all players' budgets," Johansson says. And she adds a helpful tip: "If you ask, often stores will match."

To encourage donations, she puts out a large box at the Portland Bridge Club and a sign. "Club members are generous," Johansson says. Last year, the club

collected 253 jars. Since her efforts began, Johansson and the Portland peanut butter. Bridge Club have collectively donated more than 500 jars of

peanut butter to the Oregon Food Bank.

"We can all do a small thing to help another. It's our rent payment for being a tenant of earth," she says.

Shain Oleson, Salem Bridge Club

Shain Oleson has been supporting three different charities for the past seven years. He works closely with the Community Action Agency's Home Youth & Resource Center in conjunction with Taylor's House, the Marion/Polk Food Share, and the Humane Society.

According to Oleson, HYRC has two components: one is a drop-in day center for at-risk and homeless teens, 11-17; the second is Taylor's House, a 24-hour day

shelter for teens, 11-18, who need housing.

"HYRC provides food, clothing, hygiene items, school supplies, a jobs program, and social activities," says Oleson. "Taylor's House has 10 beds, and the goal is to help find stable,

long-term housing, working with families, DHS and other agencies."

Marion/Polk Food Share provides food to local food banks and agencies that provide meals to those in need.

"Every month more than 46,000 people receive nutritious food through the program," Oleson says.

The Humane Society fights to end suffering of animals. "Each year they care for more than a thousand animals through rescue teams, sanctuaries, and wildlife centers," says Oleson.

Oleson is a firm believer in helping people help themselves, but feels people need to make sure those in need don't fall through the cracks while learning.

"HYRC helps youths learn the skills they need to be successful while making sure that they have their basic needs met," Oleson says.

Oleson decided to bring his efforts to the Salem Bridge Club because he thinks it's important for all do what they can to make things right. "Together we can make our community a better place for everyone," he says.

The club has an annual holiday charity

"Often these charities will come and speak to our members before our larger games to let everyone know what they do," he says. "We also do a back-to-school drive to collect school supplies in August."

Oleson says the club's charity drive typically raises between \$2,000 and \$3,000 just for the charities he supports. The Salem Bridge Club and its members have raised more than \$30,000 in total to support various charities over seven years.

Oleson encourages others to donate to charities. "Even small amounts can make a huge difference in the lives of those in need," he says.

five cards, you are in $6 \diamondsuit$. not the best spot, needing to bring in this combo for one loser: O 10 x in dummy opposite A 98 x x.



Add a card to either hand and the play of the A then lead up to Q 10 is best.

Playing various card combinations to best advantage can be found in Watson's "Play of the Hand," in bridge encyclopedias, and on various websites.

Tolliver: Player will spend retirement exploring Colombia, nearby countries

At the opening ceremonies, when the teams and players were introduced, the South Americans cheered, clapped and sang while players from most of the world proceeded quietly.

"They were an excitable group and it was fun to watch them," Tolliver said.

As retirement approached, Tolliver considered what he might do with his free time. He decided to learn Spanish, planning to visit historic sites in South and Central America. He began researching the countries in hopes of finding one that would provide a suitable home. He looked for a place free from the drawbacks that plague many countries in the region: financial difficulties, high inflation, unbearable pollution, frequent earthquakes or flooding. He settled on Colombia.


"Colombia had been home to the infamous drug cartels, but after a decade-long struggle with corruption and violence, the country eradicated the cartels and has been a thriving country ever since," Tolliver said. "The people are welcoming and the climate is - depending on what you like and the location - almost ideal."

Tolliver cited Medellin, a mountain city where temperatures are in the 60-80-degree range year-round, as an example. But he's starting in Bogota, the fourth-largest city in Latin America.

He visited Colombia a few times and liked what he saw: a population of predominantly active, healthy people with very few smokers and little obesity. There's a community of expats from the U.S., Canada and Europe, and frequent flights to the United States are available.

Tolliver grew up in Socorro, N.M., a small town, playing chess throughout high school and exploring the world through stamp collecting. He moved to Albuquerque to attend the University of New Mexico in the early 1970s.

One day at the student union, he was called to a table by a chess player he knew, where three guys were desperately seeking a fourth for bridge.



Portland, Mark Tolliver moved to Bogota, Colombia, in early November. He plans to spend his retirement exploring the country and others in Central and South America. One of the top players in the district, Tolliver is an Emerald Life Master with more than 8000 masterpoints who has played in a few world championships, including a fourthplace finish in the 2015 D'Orsi Senior Teams.

After 35 years in

"I, of course, explained that I had zero, and I mean zero, knowledge of bridge, but they refused to be denied," he said. "They said they would tell me what to do and whoever was dummy would help me play my cards."

He got the typical points spiel: aces are 4, kings are 3, etc., plus points for distribution. They told him you need 13 points to open, but only 11 of them need to be in honor points. "My head was swimming," Tolliver said.

Soon a hand came up where Tolliver, in

third seat, held four aces, three kings, two queens and a jack: 30 HCP but "only" 10 honors. Thinking he needed 11 honors to open, Tolliver passed! When the hand was passed out, the other players, holding 4, 3 and 3 points, suspected something was amiss. "They grabbed my 30-point hand and were howling," he said.

While Tolliver thought the game seemed fun, he discovered one crucial advantage bridge had over chess: women. "Young women played bridge, but there wasn't more than one woman who played

in all the chess tournaments I attended," Tolliver said. "This seemed like a good game!"

He went to the bookstore immediately after the game and bought some bridge books. Because several of the good chess players in Albuquerque were also strong bridge players, he quickly had a network of players happy to help mentor him.

As he progressed as a bridge player, Tolliver realized the level of competition in Albuquerque wasn't strong enough for him to achieve his goals.

"If I wanted to really play against worldclass players, I was going to have to live in a city like Los Angeles, Chicago or New York," Tolliver said. "So, I joined the Coast Guard after they promised me that no one in their right mind would volunteer to go to New York, and if that was my preference, I was assured of getting stationed there once I completed my training school."

After the Coast Guard, Tolliver remained in New York for 10 years, finishing college at the City University of New York and then going to work for a major accounting firm. He later worked for Lehman Brothers as an analyst for the airline industry. He married Gail Lowy, a bridge player who had come to New York from Portland as a child. They decided to move to Portland, arriving in early 1985. They later divorced and she moved to Florida.

Tolliver continued to work in finance and in 2008 became the debt management analyst for the city of Gresham until retiring recently. He's also been working on writing a novel, a project he plans to give more time to in retirement. His other interests include poetry and Russian literature. And now, high on his list is exploring his new home, one of the most biodiverse places on earth.

There are few English speakers in Colombia. "But I love a good challenge, and I have been working on learning Spanish for a few years now," Tolliver said. "I'll come back from time to time to see my bridge friends."

While the ACBL is on track to turn a substantial profit this year, this follows some high-profile losses in recent years.

"I think questions need to be asked," Rowe said. "Sometimes they're hard because you're stepping on toes. Anybody who knows me knows that I'm on the outspoken side.

"I got a bee in my bonnet and I decided to run."

Rowe doesn't plan on charging like a bull into her first meeting in Columbus, though. "My goal is to sit and listen for at least the first two board meetings." she said. "Your first goal is to learn the job. Then you have the ability to say, What would happen if we tried this?' And sometimes you hear, 'We've tried that."

Vilhauer will complete his term with

the San Francisco meetings, which are likely to be finished by the time this issue reaches clubs. He'll vote on next year's ACBL president, make the appointments to the Goodwill Committee and report on the meeting in the spring

The election for district director is somewhat like an electoral college system, where votes by unit board members are weighted by the size of the units. Rowe received about 56% of the vote.

While the district president is limited to two one-year terms, a district director can serve up to four three-year terms. The pending expiration of her presidency was also a factor in her decision to run.

"I enjoy being president a lot more than I thought I would," she said.

Laws of the Game

Understanding the new convention charts

The ACBL strives to have specific rules to cover all bidding situations. Those rules are found in a set of Convention Charts on the ACBL website. The charts were most recently updated as of Nov. 20, 2018. These charts are in effect at all ACBL tournaments.

The new charts

There are four charts, intended for use in different level events:



Dennis Kendig Trumpet Contributor

Basic. Applies to games with an upper limit of 750 masterpoints per player or lower. Example: Gold Rush pairs.

Basic+. Applies to games with an upper limit of up to 3000 masterpoints per player. Example: 0-3000 B/C pairs.

Open. For games with a limit more than 3000

masterpoints, or no limit.

Open+. For games with no limit or a limit above 6000 masterpoints per player.

As you might imagine, the Open/Open+ charts are significantly more permissive than the Basic/Basic+ charts. The ACBL recommends that the Open Chart be used in open games at the club level, with the Basic Charts used for limited games, e.g., 99er or 299er games.

Opening One-of-a-Suit Bids

The new charts significantly liberalize the requirements to open one of a suit.

Previously, the General Convention Chart provided that opening 1♣/♦ had to promise a minimum of 10 HCPs, and that opening 1♥/♠ was disallowed if it showed fewer than 8 HCP. Those seemingly inconsistent requirements have now been superseded by a new test for opening bids: Either a specified number of HCP, or a Rule of "N" type test (where "N" is the number obtained by adding the HCP plus the number of cards in the two longest suits).

The new requirement is that any natural opening bid must show:

(a) In Basic Chart games, "Average Strength," i.e., at least 10 HCP or meeting the Rule of 19; and

(b) In Open Chart games, "Near Average Strength," i.e., at least 8 HCP or meeting the Rule of 17.

Opening 1NT bids

All four charts are the same here. A natural 1NT opener must show a balanced hand: no void, a singleton must be the A, K or Q, and the two longest suits may not include more than nine cards. 5-4-2-2 is OK, 5-5-2-1 is not. Strength for a natural 1NT opener must be defined as a range of no more than 5 HCP, with the low end being 10 or more. 10-14 is OK, 14-18 is OK, 15–17 is OK, but 10–15 is not. 9–13 is not. 10-12 nonvul with 15-17 vul is OK.

Opening 2NT and 3NT bids

The shape requirement is the same as for 1NT when these bids are natural; there is no defined strength requirement.

Opening 2♣ bids

(strong, artificial, forcing) On the Basic and Basic+ charts this

- must show a "very strong" hand, defined as: • at least 20 HCP; or
- at least 14 HCP and is within one trick of game assuming suits break evenly among the other hands.
- ◆ at least 5 control points (an Ace=2, a King=1) and is within one trick of game assuming suits break evenly.

The Open and Open+ charts remove the strength requirement entirely.

Preemptive Openings

In general, much more flexibility is now allowed, especially on the Open and Open+ charts, including many preempts showing two suits. In general, these are allowed when the suit bid is one of the suits shown: otherwise not allowed except in Open+ team events.

Weak Two Bids: On the Basic chart, a weak two must show five or more cards, at least 4 HCP, and a HCP range no more than 7. On the Basic+ chart, it must show five or more cards, at least 3 HCP and a HCP range no more than 8. On the Open chart, in first or second seat, it must show a HCP range no more than 9. On the Open+ chart, anything goes.

Three and Four Level Preempts: On the Basic chart, a three- or four-level preempt must promise at least six in the suit bid. On the higher level charts, anything goes.

Preempts of 4NT and Higher: Allowed on all charts.

Gambling 3NT: Allowed on all charts. **Namyats** (4♣= \heartsuit ; 4♦= \spadesuit): Allowed on all charts.

Precision and Big Club Systems

In the Basic and Basic+ charts, the 1♣ opener must show a "strong" hand:

- at least 15 HCP; or
- ◆ at least 14 HCP and meets the "Rule of 24."
- at least 5 control points and is within one trick of game assuming suits break evenly among the other hands.

The Open and Open+ charts relax this requirement to only 10 HCP/Rule of 19.

1 • **Opener** (may be short, not forcing)

For the Basic chart, it's 10 HCP/Rule of 19 and 3+ diamonds or notrump shape. just as in Standard American. There's no provision for a 1♦ bid that "could be as short as 0/1". Thus 3-4-1-5 hands will be stuck for an opening bid. The Basic+ is the same but relaxes the HCP to 8/Rule of 17. In the Open and Open+ Charts, the shape requirement is dropped, but the strength for a 1♦ opener is 8 HCP/Rule of 17 if Natural or Quasi Natural (2+ ♦) or 10 HCP/Rule of 19 if Artificial (could be as short as 1 or 0).

2♣ Opener (clubs, not forcing)

In Basic and Basic+, must show 10 HCP/Rule of 19 and four or more clubs. Not defined specifically in Open/Open+, but no doubt allowed.

Upgrades/deviations

Many players are accustomed to shading their bids. Maybe we agreed on 10-12 notrumps, but we pick up an A, K and Q, along with a few 10s and 9s. That feels like 10! So, we open 1NT. The new charts say:

"If an Agreement would be disallowed unless it satisfies a specific High Card Point or shape requirement, a player may not use judgment to include hands with fewer High Card Points or a different shape."

This applies to all charts. You can't open 1NT with 9 HCP, no matter what. If you use the full 5 HCP notrump range, say 11–15, you can't upgrade a 10 HCP hand nor downgrade a 16 HCP hand. Also, you can't open 1NT with a singleton jack (except in Open+ team games). You can't make other openings with less than the minimum HCP/Rule of N shown in the applicable chart. So, the charts are not simply restricting the agreements, they are also in some cases restricting bids that depart from the partnership agreement.

Part of a general liberalization trend

Clearly, the ACBL is gradually liberalizing bidding rules to reflect, they say, what they "see at the table" in tournaments. Consider these changes:

- ◆ Aug. 1, 2016. Allowed 1NT openers with a singleton, provided it's the ace, king or queen.
- ◆ Jan. 1, 2018. No more "Stop" cards. Fewer people were using them and the ACBL thought their use might transmit unauthorized information, so they banned them.
- ◆ Nov. 20, 2018. Now, we have new charts with more generous criteria for opening bids (Basic: 10 HCP/Rule of 19; Open: 8 HCP/Rule of 17).

What should your club do?

Clubs will be on firm ground if they adopt the Open chart for their Open games, and the Basic (or Basic+) chart for their 99er and 299er games. Adopting the ACBL charts lets everyone know in advance what will and will not be permitted in their games. It's also helpful to club members who play in tournaments to become familiar with the new criteria for opening bids, for example, as they might otherwise be surprised and/or at a disadvantage when playing against competitors who are more accustomed to life under the new rules.

Teachers' Corner

How team games work

Be a team player. Being a team player is fun.

Bridge is partnership game. Players develop their favorite partnerships as they learn conventions and trust partners' responses. This partnership is the first part of becoming a team. In a pairs game, each partnership competes against the other partnerships in the event. In a team game, four players compete against another team of four. Your team only takes on one team at a time and the team that scores the most is the winner of the match.

A team can consist of four, five or six players, but only four team members play at the same time. Two members of your team, playing as a partnership, sit North-South at one

table. Two other members of your team sit East-West at a different table. The two pairs from the opposing team fill the empty spots at the same two tables. During the course of a match, the same boards are played at both tables. Scoring is done

by comparing the results with different schemes used.

The method of scoring on each board is the same as in pairs events. At the end of play, the team reunites at the N/S table to review results and calculate International Match Points (IMPs). IMPs are just a derivative method of simplifying the score. It is exciting to compare how your team members play the boards. The overriding idea is to have your team collect more IMPs than your opponents. A team scores IMPs when their combined scores are positive. There is a chart on the Team Private Score sheet that converts the combined board score to an IMP score.

Teaching using a team format is an effective tool for players to learn the nuances of bidding and play of the hand. Many tournament events bracket teams of similar ability. Join the fun, gather some favorite players, share the adventure, and be a team player.







Stratification by average

Quilter keeps Corvallis club walls covered



Anyone who has ever played at the Heart of the Valley Bridge Center knows how the noise level can rapidly rise in the cavernous room where we play — and we are a very social club. To help alleviate the problem, longtime member **Richard Garvin** asked permission to hang some of his wife's quilts to reduce the noise. **Debbie** selected some of her quilts and the two of them hung them on the walls and beams of the playing area in early 2018.

"I noticed negligible noise suppression," Rick said, "but the response from the players was positive." It was more than positive. The other members were delighted to have a soothing quilt display of such amazing creativity and skill hanging before their eyes, especially after a rough hand.

Debbie first started quilting in 1977 when her first child was born.

"I was a teacher and took maternity leave," she said. "I was bored to death and saw a quilt—as-you-go pattern that I could make for our bed. I had never taken classes and I knew nothing about quilting. My mother furnished me with scraps from dresses and bedroom curtains. I used a

When Rick joined the ACBL, he played mainly in Albany. Since then, he has served on the Albany, Corvallis and Unit 477 boards. He retired in 2010 and began to play more. Recently, after a couple of very successful two-hour bridge seminars he presented, **Ann Larson** asked Rick to teach some intermediate bridge classes.

Despite the aggravation that bridge occasionally creates, Rick has found a way to keep going. "I try to capture snippets of enjoyable events and write them in a folder called Rick's Happy Basket," he said. "I read them when I get discouraged and want to quit this game!"

extraneous information, the director should interrupt the play to award the artificial adjusted score.

The choice of artificial adjusted score to give was correct; that is, neither you nor your opponents were at fault for a table result being unachievable. When a pair is in no way at fault, they should receive an average plus.

When a director is forced to give an artificial adjusted score such as this, he should also consider giving a procedural penalty to the players who caused the problem. That is, Law 90.B.3 indicates that one offense subject to procedural penalty is "discussion of the bidding, play or result of a board, which may be overheard at another table."

At a club game, the procedural penalty may take the form of a sternly worded warning. At a tournament, we are more likely to assess penalties that will offset the amount that was artificially added by awarding average plus scores to both NS and EW at the next table.

Sherry's trouble understanding Tom's raises


Sherry Squirrel is pacing and kicking herself.

[Sherry's POV]

I can never figure out how my game is going during the game. This time I was lucky enough to play with Tom Tortoise. We had never played together and did not have a whole lot of time to fill out a card or discuss styles (which Owl says is more important than a convention card). We played standard signals and no conventions over notrump openers.

Tom is 96 years young. He cannot see the cards so well as his prescription is quite old, but he focuses and asks about each card if he is unsure. Boy can he play the spots off the cards.

I picked up:



Tom passes and my RHO opens 1♣. I make a lead-directing 1♠ bid, thinking that if Tom cannot open, it must be their hand. They tell me that a passed hand


cannot make a forcing bid, but I discovered an exception today. Tom bid 2♣. I wondered if the person on my right had opened a convenient minor, and he only promised three. I did look at his card. I passed. Apparently, one is not supposed

to pass a cuebid. It is forcing, even if you are a passed hand. You are telling partner that you like their bid and have close to an opening hand. If he had not liked my bid and had clubs, he would have bid notrump or passed. I hope that I never pass partner in a cuebid again.

Tom played his 2–2 club fit rather than my playing a 5–5 spade fit. We were off to a great start.


I never give up, that is what is so much fun about this game; you can have a few zeroes and still win or place in the top half.

So later in the game I open 2♠, lefty passes, Tom bids 4♠, and righty passes. This hand comes down. He has 6 HCP!



I am appalled and struck deaf. I will remember to mention this at the postmortem when we see what others have done. I thought that one needed to have 18 HCP to jump to game after a preemptive bid. Turns out we got a 75% on this. Now I am starting to learn about the law of total tricks.

Last, but not least, they opened 1♦ to my left, Tom overcalls 1♠, and I hold:



I do not think that I have enough to bid. It goes, pass, pass, 3♣, Tom bids 3♥ in tempo and Hawk doubles, so with my six hearts, I get excited and redouble. Who would blame me? Squirrels are excitable creatures and we have a double fit! And we go down for a 75 percent. It turns out to be the same whether we score minus 200 or minus 400. But it was so much fun.

I will not have to explain that our score on the cuebid passed was a zero. I could hardly wait to tell them at the postmortem that I made 2♥ doubled at the team game.

Gold events pay gold only for section tops or two-session overalls. Gold points are awarded for two-session overalls, all section tops in two-session events, and overall ranks in KO events with a bracket ceiling of at least 750 points. All other points are red.

Overheard at the next table

Q: I overheard the table next to me lamenting missing a grand slam. I pull out a massive hand from the board and suspect this hand. I felt uncomfortable but decided to proceed and opened 2♣. My LHO made an artificial call and partner bid a positive, natural suit. I have a huge fit for partner, a void, and like six aces. I said to the table, "I don't know if I can carry on, I heard something at the last table. Let me fetch the director." The director ruled that I had unauthorized information and could not proceed normally with the auction and gave both pairs at my table an average plus.

My question, was I wrong to open 2♣ and try to start an auction? At what point do I go the director?

A: What a difficult position to be in! Yes, this is one of the many reasons why we need to reserve our wonderful discussions of the hands until after the session and avoid, as much as possible, unnecessary conversation about the scores. Even announcing the score of 1460 or 2220 is enough to let nearby tables know that a slam may be available and that can put those players in awkward positions. Even worse is a statement like, "If I only finessed East for the queen, I would have made the slam!"

Fortunately, there is a Law that covers this topic, specifically Law 16.D deals with Extraneous Information from Other Sources. Basically, as soon as a player acquires such extraneous knowledge, he should call the director so that the director may monitor. The easiest situation is something where the board spilled some cards and the North player sees cards from the South hand. In that type of situation, the director will likely have the North player hold the South cards for that one hand only so that normal play can continue. Or if it is the first round of a shuffle/deal/play event, the director may ask the players to simply redeal. Or maybe there is a substitute player that can fill in for the one hand.

Those are the easy situations. The type of situation you describe is far more common and much harder to accommodate. If the information is so very revealing (like the statement above about the queen in one hand making the slam), it may be impossible for play to occur. If so, the director should be prepared to award artificial adjusted scores (such as the average plus to both sides when neither is at fault). In general, we try to avoid giving artificial adjusted scores and try to get real bridge results to decide our bridge contests. When possible, the director should monitor and allow play to continue, with the hopes that the player in possession of the extraneous information has clear decisions at each point, untainted by the extraneous information.

For example, in the hand you cited, it sounds as if the 2♣ opening call was obvious, as was the decision to explore slam/grand slam when your partner made a positive bid and you had a fit. If all of your calls are obvious based upon the authorized information of the cards and the auction to date, then there is not necessarily a reason to disallow play of the hand. If at some juncture, there is a decision to be made and one choice becomes clearer/more obvious due to the
