Pair on streak in D20 NA events

The pair that won both of the top flights of District 20's Grand National Teams this spring also won the top flight of the North American Pairs this fall.

Ben Bomber and **Amy Casanova** have put up an impressive streak in the grass roots events, winning the GNT Open, GNT A and NAP A in the same year.

Earlier this year, they separately represented the district in the 2021 NAP at the Spring NAOBC after qualifying in 2019,

Casanova in A and Bomber in B. Playing together, they reached the semifinals of the 2019 GNT Flight B in Las Vegas. Separately, they have each had numerous wins at the district level in these events. Bomber previously won NAP A in the

2018-19 cycle playing with **Rich Carle**, and he won the GNT Flight B in 2015.

Casanova has represented the district in the NAP every year since 2016, going three times in B and now three times in A. She also played on the GNT Flight B teams in 2015 and 2016.

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Early tournaments average 40% of '19 turnout

The return to tournament bridge has proceeded slowly in the closing months of 2021, across the ACBL and especially in District 20, where just two tournament have been held.

When the first few tournaments of the year were held in August, District 20 was at the front of the line. Vancouver Unit

452 held the first open sectional of the year Aug. 13–15, a week after the first two limited sectionals in the Carolinas.

The ACBL canceled most tournaments that month and decided not to staff any. Only I/N sectionals and downgraded sectionals, which can be staffed with local directors were allowed. Vancouver considered allowing the tournament to be canceled but chose to downgrade instead, with Hal Montgomery and Rich Carle stepping in as directors. Jeff Jacob is the tournament director normally assigned. Despite being downgraded, masks were still required under Washington state rules.

Everything else tentatively scheduled in the district in the fall was canceled except a 299er sectional in Corvallis in November. The tournaments that did return came back to much smaller attendance than

I don't know why the end of a calendar year inspires fresh starts, renewed enthusiasm and vigor; but there is no better time than 2022 to metaphorically pick up the bridge world, dust it off a little bit, and get back to work.

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The district has several vacant positions: president, education liaison and I/N coor-

dinator. As our community ages, fewer people come forward to volunteer. As our tournaments shrink and costs go up, we have less in the budget to compensate people. It's a vicious cycle. All of us who work in bridge admit we don't do it for the money, we do it for the love of the game.

The year 2022 will be an important one for rebuilding our board.

Managing Editor Margie Redden is the outgoing I/N coordinator. For years, she has entertained us in the Trumpet Ye with her menagerie of bridge-playing forest dwellers – relatable characters who, with frets and follies, work their way not through the process of learning duplicate.

At every regional, she has coordinated guest speakers, passed out prize beads, taken photos, and answered uncountable questions. She has been a supportive cheerleader for players of all levels, with energy and a positive attitude. Thank you, Margie, for all your hard work and effort.

Mike Eyer is coming to the end of his two-year term as president. Although it wasn't quite the kind of two years he was expecting, he nonetheless stepped up and

stayed focused, pivoting to online play, Zoom meetings galore and virtually connecting with other administrators in the bridge world to plan for the future. Thank you, Mike, for leading the district through the pandemic.

While it's been great to be able to play online while in-person gathering has not been safe, I don't see it as a replacement. I miss seeing and talking to people. I miss the connections, and how those enrich our lives.

Yes, we can click on cards and solve the bridge puzzles on the computer – perhaps even better than at the table – but that's not really the point. I think of all the lonely people out there, stuck at home and isolated. I think of all the teenagers and young adults, growing up in a world of screens and 10-second video clips, yearning for real human interaction. I can't think of a better opportunity than being introduced to bridge, and the energy of a real bridge club.

It's OK if the game is secondary. If you've taken a break during the past two years, come back! It doesn't matter if you feel rusty or forget a convention and go down 1100. I play all the time and that still happens to me. It's not about being perfect or anywhere close to that. Sure, it's no fun to make a mistake, but everyone does it.

Kibitzing a lot of bridge to write articles comes with the territory of my new job. You would not believe some of the bids and plays I see. Crazy mistakes are made by world-class professionals. Trust me.

What matters is that bridge connects people. Bridge saves lives because it connects people. I can think of countless conversations that lead to a referral of a doctor or a plumber or a book or something that changes a person's life.

Try to introduce a friend or a neighbor – or one of their kids – to the game. For those who are struggling to find their place in the world, bridge truly can be a lifesaver.

Tearing up the tournament trail, or just tires?

I think it was June when we started talking about doing a story in the Bridge Bulletin on the first regional. I was asked about going to Atlanta in September, and at the time that sounded like a good idea.

Then, a few weeks later, I was asked about going to Palm Beach, where a regional had been scheduled for the week before Atlanta. I think at the time Florida accounted for 20% of all covid cases, and I thought that sounded like a re-

ally bad idea.

I hoped it would be canceled and that they would send me to Seaside, where I was already planning to go, to cover the first regional. Wherever the first regional was, I hoped it would not be in Florida. The Palm Beach Regional did get canceled, along with Atlanta and everything else in August and most of everything else in September. And for a while, Seaside was the first regional on the calendar.

Then, when it was canceled, Cincinnati, set for the week after Seaside, became my target. My family lives in Cincinnati, and I have a free place to stay there, so it's convenient. I hoped this one would live.

It might have been canceled if they had been set about having a regional or bust, but organizers opted to make it a downgraded sectional so they could guarantee it could be held. That was a bit of a wrinkle in my "first regional" story, but at that point my plans were set. The Flying Pig Un-Regional had an unusual schedule, starting on a Sunday and ending on a Thursday, avoiding the days when hotel space is most expensive. I was planning to play only Tuesday through Thursday, but I have two nephews who were born in summer 2020, so I wanted to include some extra days for visiting family. So I was driving up on the Saturday before. I like going to Cincinnati because it's cheap. Well, we can't have a travel story in this column without a travel disaster. I had made it as far as Nashville - less than halfway, it was around 4:30 - when I encountered an object in the road that tore up my tire. There was an exit right there, so as I was moving toward a place I could pull over, I continued up the exit ramp until the sound coming from my front wheel sternly told me I should go no farther.

I called AAA. I reached someone who wasn't interested in helping. She made up some BS about not being able to access my account, put me on hold and hung up. I got out to take a picture and a passerby stopped to help but found I didn't have a jack. It was maybe 15 minutes after the first call when I called AAA again. This time it was as usual, and they dispatched someone.

> When he got me fixed up, around 5:40, I was told not to go more than 50 miles on the spare. Making it to Cincinnati was out, but I wanted to avoid losing a day and paying for a place to stay if possible. There had to be some tire shops still open.

When I arrived, I met Bobbie and found out she played no conventions other than Stayman, transfers and regular Blackwood. Essentially I had no forcing bids after the first round of an auction. Not what I'm used to, but still, it was fine.

It was so nice being back at a tournament, playing bridge with people instead of a screen. It was small with only about 20 tables each session, but there were people from all over, and it was enough for a fun event.

I got to score a beer card playing 3NT making six. I was especially proud of making a difficult 4♥ on an endplay only to find Deep Finesse thought I should make six. And I had this fun auction:

declarer to overruff with the \clubsuit Q. Declarer exits the \clubsuit K and I win. Another low heart is ruffed by Amy's \bigstar 10 and declarer can't beat it. Amy plays her fourth diamond, declarer ruffing with the \clubsuit 8, and I overruff with the \clubsuit J.

I play my last heart. Declarer could have ruffed low but perhaps thought we were out of clubs. He ruffed with the $\clubsuit7$ and at the last trick played the $\pounds2$ to my $\pounds6$. Down six, 1700. In a partscore.

Pretty much everyone else was in 3NT our way. When they stepped in, I considered showing my club stopper immediately, but considering the vulnerability, I wanted to wait and see what happened. I was delighted to pass the double. We only needed to get it down two to get a better score than we had coming in 3NT.

I've got some more trips planned, so I'm hoping to avoid disaster on the way to and from Austin and Las Vegas. After that, I'm thinking about the **Oregon Trail Regional**. That evening session looks fun, especially the Thursday-Friday Swiss.

Eleven pairs qualify for Reno

On Halloween weekend 66 pairs played in the finals of the District 20 North American Pairs competition. The top finishers earned extra masterpoints and first-place finishers will receive a stipend towards expenses in the Spring NABC.

In addition to a \$700 stipend to offset the expenses of attending the nationals, first place in Flight A paid 25.60 gold points, 18 points in Flight B, and 12 in Flight C. There is nowhere else you can win points and get paid to go to the nationals. I hope we will see more pairs playing next year.

The NAPs are a grass-roots national championship. In order to be eligible to represent us at the nationals everybody has to qualify in a NAP club qualifying game. The qualifying games are held nationally during June, July and August.

You don't have to play in a qualifying game in District 20. You may play in any ACBL-sanctioned qualifying game. Though you may qualify anywhere in ACBL land, you must be a member of

the district in which you play the finals.

Everybody who played in our finals was a D20 member except for a fill-in pair in Flight A, drafted at the last minute so that nobody would have a sitout.

I received many inquiries about players that some thought might not be eligible. Our director in charge checked everybody. Please don't worry about players from outside our district playing. They aren't eligible.

Our director does a lot of work. Besides checking the points and residence of every player, the director sets up the movements and has to be flexible as our fields change. In the open pairs we had an uneven number and were happy to add a pair the day before the finals.

We were left scrambling when we received a last-minute cancellation. I was calling players at 10:50 before our 11 a.m. start time. Luckily, we found a fill-in pair at the last minute. We found pairs and players in Flights B and C as well. In all our flights we played movements in which all the players played the same number of boards against all the other pairs. Seeding is not much of a factor when everybody plays everybody.

Rich Carle, our D20 webmaster, also does a tremendous amount of work. He coordinates the entries and posts the convention cards. Our events would never run as smoothly without his tireless work.

Ethics Take care to avoid giving UI in F2F games

Several years ago, my partner, Peggy McCluskey, and I were playing in a sectional in Eugene and our opponents were Roger McNay and his partner. On the first board, they were in $6\clubsuit$, and it was down one when it should have been down three as we failed to cash a good heart plus one other trick. At the end of the round, Roger asked if he could speak with me away from the table. He wanted to let me know how much unauthorized information I was providing to my partner. "I knew you had the cashing ♥A plus another trick. You cannot be doing that at the table." Up to that point I had taken pride in my table presence. Roger's

kind counseling was a bit of a rude awakening.

So, what's the point? The point is that while I thought my table presence was impeccable, it was anything but that. With the return of f2f bridge, it's worth spending a little time discussing UI at the table.

Trumpet Contributor _____ the time discussing at the table. It's Law 16 that

deals with unauthorized information, and it is one of the laws we should all be very, very familiar with. The part of the law that I am addressing here is partner's "tempo, expression, mannerisms, remarks, and other such behavior."

We all know that we should, as much as possible, bid and play in tempo. Consider this situation though. You are next to play to a trick and you begin to pull a card, change your mind, and select another card. Innocent enough. However, you have now provided your partner with UI. Partner now knows that you have at least one more card in that suit. (Assumption here is that we all know that "coffeehousing" – attempting to deceive the opponents by pretending to have more than one card in a suit when you hold a singleton – is illegal.)

Similarly, wincing or shifting ever so slightly when partner fails to lead your suit or give you your ruff are all examples of UI. Are they overt and egregious? No. However, UI is UI is UI.

Established partnerships especially must pay attention here. When playing with a regular partner, it is very easy to tell when partner is pleased or displeased.

When you provide UI at the table, you are likely creating a problem for partner. A play or call that partner might have been intending to make may no longer be available.

To quote Jeff Goldsmith, a team lead on the National Appeals Committee and a casebook commentator, "UI arises. It is not illegal to transmit UI to partner unintentionally. That happens. Bridge is a hard game, so we have to think sometimes. All sorts of problems arise which can cause UI. These are normally not infractions of the law."

Once again, what's the point? Well, the point is, the possibility exists that most of us could probably tighten up our game in this area. If the shoe fits here, then that is not a good thing. You need to find another pair of shoes.

Sherry Squirrel says goodbye

Farewell to all my former bridge buddies.

Bridge online is way more fun than I had thought. But I always thought that I would lose out on my real life if I got addicted to online bridge. Real life at the bridge club might be a little overrated, and cheating is definitely the negative, sad, hard-to-believe downside of online bridge.

Now I find that I have no idea about who has passed at the bridge club.

Of course, all of us have passed. Unfortunately, lots of good partners have passed away. So, this article is in memoriam to all the sad losses of partners since March of 2020.

Bridge is so much a partnership game and it is so sad to lose a good partner. You had your favorite conventions worked out. Now you need to work out conventions with a new partner. We are unhappy to disappoint partner while annoyed at ourself.

One of the newer conventions to this squirrel is Spiral. It is a wonderful conven-

tion describing opener's hand as minimum or maximum, with three- or four-card support. It's easy to use and so useful in getting to game or staying out of bad games. There was a good article in the ACBL Bridge Bulletin about it (November 2020, p23).

One of the most impressive players (an Owl) told me her favorite convention is when partner opens 1NT, responder asks $2\clubsuit$ Stayman, and partner answers with either major. If the answer is $2\clubsuit$, $3\bigstar$ sets hearts as trump, if the answer is $2\bigstar$, $3\bigstar$ sets spades as trump. So now you can cue bid at the four level or ask Blackwood around your agreed upon suit. What a clever convention and so useful.

Every time you add a new convention to your card, you give up a natural bid, but sometimes the lost bid had no real use to you anyway.

One couple told me they have a partnership agreement not to lead a doubleton. Not my favorite lead, nor an agreement I

am likely to adopt.

Loser count is my favorite hand evaluation, once we have a fit.

"Win the postmortem by leading your partner's suit." That's something I cannot get the robots to do.

Support your partner is one of my favorite mantras.

This is not a convention, but a great partnership agreement: Don't discuss hands until the game is over.

See you at the club. I played yesterday and attendance was very light. It was quite fun, except when I revoked. Focus, focus.

My favorite memorial from a long-married bridge couple: "Admit 2 to the adventure of a lifetime." Bridge just adds so much life to a partnership. The bridge community is quite empathetic.

I started the Sherry Squirrel journey with bridge rules of which there are so many, and ended on partnership agreements and conventions of which there are even more.

Now Sherry is one of many, teaching BridgeWhiz kids to expose the next generation to this amazing game. I am now Margi.redden@BridgeWhiz.org.




Suzanne St. Thomas, maniac47 Boise ID



started a full-length session at 7. On Tuesday, Wednesday and Saturday,

there will be an 18-board pairs game that is part of a series (which means the potential for extra points if you play in more than one session), and on Thursday and Friday there will be a two-session Swiss event. You must play both Thursday and Friday if you enter that event. This has the potential to be a really fun event like the midnight events at the nationals.

As an additional enticement to get this reimagined evening session going, entry fees will be discounted to \$10.

Instead of our usual playing area, we will be in the Discovery Ballroom, located on the south side of the Hilton to the left of where the events are usually held. Please be on the lookout for signs and in-

structions regarding vaccination requirements, mask mandates and the location of the events you are playing.

Although there are still uncertainties, I believe the OTR will be a welcome experience of face-to-face tournament bridge we all have been missing.

they had seen in the past. The Vancouver Sectional drew 54 tables, which was 27% of the 2019 count.

Without hospitality costs - food was not allowed – the tournament made money even with low numbers, said Joe Morgan, Unit 452 president. But between the mask requirement and the lack of hospitality, it wasn't the same. "It wasn't as pleasant as a real tournament," he said.

The Corvallis 299er Sectional saw 17 tables, half of 2019. "It was small by our standards," said Bob Peery, for whom the tournament is named and who co-directed. "We hope to be back to bigger and better things next year."

This level of turnout was typical of 2021 tournaments.

In the first two months that tournaments were allowed, the largest was a Labor Day weekend sectional in Skokie, Ill., near Chicago, which drew 138 tables - 30% of 2019. A sectional held in Detroit a few weeks later drew 134 tables, which was 47% of 2019, much better than most tournaments have been able to achieve relative to past attendance. Except for some very small tournaments that were already under 100 tables in 2019, none has broken 50%.

The nearest tournament to District 20, a sectional in Sacramento in September, saw 79 tables, 38% of 2019.

Vancouver normally would have had another sectional in November. While it may not have passed muster for ACBL staffing, the same option to downgrade would still exist. But knowing the mask requirement would still be in place, the unit chose to cancel, Morgan said. "We've had even bigger pushback," he said. "The people who were supportive of face-to-face bridge have decided not to play in person until the mask requirement is done."

The first regional scheduled to be held in 2021 was for a while a moving target as

one after another was canceled. Seaside would have been the first, but it too was canceled.

In October, the first regionals were held. First there was an "un-regional" — a tournament originally planned as a regional that became a downgraded sectional to avoid cancellation. Despite the downgraded status, the Cincinnati Flying Pig Un-Regional still attracted more than 50 visitors from 12 states including Arizona, Florida and New York. With 202 tables, it was the largest to date as of its closing.

In 2019 the Flying Pig Regional ran a typical regional schedule: seven days with three sessions a day five of those days. In 2021 the un-regional ran just five days with two sessions a day. Adjusting for the fewer sessions, Cincinnati's table count was 28% of 2019.

A week later came the first official regional, the Motor City Regional in Detroit. With 331 tables, the regional matched the 47% turnout that was set at the sectional a month earlier.

The biggest tournament to date, by a factor of 3, was the Las Vegas Regional in November, the first regional there since 2017. With 924 tables, it was a big step in getting people back to tournaments. But still attendance was only 42% of a tournament so disappointing they took it off the schedule for a few years.

There's also been a three-day regional in Chicago and a sectional with an I/N regional in Minneapolis. Assuming all those currently scheduled happen, by the time the Oregon Trail Regional is held in February, there will have been 17 open regionals since October.

But the outlook for tournaments remains grim, as many players have developed a preference for the online game.

"I'm really worried about face-to-face," Morgan said. "We're really going to have start encouraging the social aspect or we're never going to get people back."

Playing bridge on autopilot can wreck your game


If you sometimes play bridge on autopilot, it means you're going on muscle memory, not pausing to think about your play or your strategy, failing to consider the possible consequences of a play.

Declarers especially must snap out of it before commencing play.

In this online hand, if South took the road of finesses, there definitely would be regrets. Yes, overtricks are gold in matchpoint play, but playing for overtricks at the risk of going down is fool's gold.

When dummy is tabled after the lead, South counts his possible losers: a club, diamond and spade. If the club finesse is on, there is no club loser. If the spade finesse is on, there is no spade loser.

So tempting. But he should consider what might happen if a finesse fails.

The opening lead of the $\clubsuit 2$ looks like a singleton. He didn't lead his partner's suit. If South finesses the queen, losing to the king, West ruffs the club return, gets back to East with a diamond, and overruffs

South's 9 with the 10 of trumps. Down two. A prudent South will go up with the A to avoid that scenario.

South now considers a trump finesse. But wait. If it loses to the king, East cashes the ♣K, leads another club, ruffed by West, and the defense gets a spade, a club, a diamond and a club ruff. Down one.

The only sensible thing to do is cash the \bigstar A and lead another spade, hoping for a happy split of trumps. If trumps don't split well, the plan still works if the long spades are in East's hand, or, if not, if East has a singleton honor.

In this deal, South could afford to lose the ♣K, but not a club ruff. And he could afford to lose the \bigstar K, but not that club ruff. After two rounds of trumps, West had no spade left to ruff a club.

At many of the other tables, the declarers followed the crowd of finesse takers and lived to regret it.

Hand No. 2

On this BBO deal, with 11 high card points and six nice clubs. North took a chance that South either had the ♣A or could get to dummy after knocking out the ace.

However, South has to think things through before embarking on a line of play. If a Tesla can crash on autopilot, so can a declarer. South has to be aware and nimble enough to be able to switch gears if necessary

When West tabled the ♥ J, South was looking at only four cashing tricks. He has to find a bunch more.

If South leads a club to dummy, East can't take the ace right away, otherwise South gets five clubs and four tricks in the other three suits, making the contract.

If East ducks the first club, South could switch to diamonds and try the finesse. It

loses, a heart comes back, and now declarer has only eight tricks.

On the other hand, if South tries to set up clubs, East can simply hold off until the third round, clear the hearts, and now South gets only six tricks — two clubs. two hearts, a diamond and a spade.

It doesn't matter who has the $\bigstar K$, the queen can never provide an entry to dummy. If West has it, he'll take it and cash his hearts. If East has it, she gobbles North's queen and leads a diamond to West's king.


The solution is for South to lead clubs twice. When East doesn't take his ace either time (and he must not), South then can switch to diamonds, giving up a diamond to West's king, earning his nine tricks — two clubs, two hearts, a spade and four diamonds.

East has to be smart enough to hold up on the \bigstar A. But South has to be equally sharp and count his winners, abandoning clubs and switching gears after two rounds when East holds up on the ace.

Masterpoint races



Dear Jeff,

Here's one that won't happen on BBO. At my local club, three players pulled the cards from one board, but the fourth player had cards from a different board. We finally noticed when, after the opening lead and dummy came down, the third seat had several of the same cards as the dummy! We then saw that the colors on the backs of the cards were different - red and blue.

Who's responsible?

P.S.: Three people were actually guilty, the one person with the blue cards had pulled from the right board.

Color Blind

Dear Color Blind,

I seem to get this ruling a couple times a year. Law 15 in the Laws of Duplicate Bridge covers the situation. If only one person had pulled the wrong hand, and we catch it before partner bids, we get to back up the auction and bid with the correct hand. Most of the time, it is not until dummy comes down that somebody notices that are two cards the same. In case if you have a singular offender, it is average minus for the offending side and average plus for the non-offending side. In this case we actually have two offending sides and both get average minus.

Now for the hard part: A second board may be affected. If the cards came from a previous board, then no damage. If they came form a board the partnerships have yet to play, then the auction needs to be monitored to see if the hand(s) makes the same bid; if they do, no damage done. If they don't, then we again go with average minus for the offender(s), and average plus for the non-offending side.

Dear Jeff,

I noticed there seems to be a level of toxicity that comes with online play. Any suggestions?

- Good Vibes

Dear Good Vibes,

Yes, a lot of comments can be perceived as unpleasant, but as a player you can only control yourself. As a director, I like calls that only state the facts, i.e., North is not bidding, East is not playing, West has gone "red" (meaning they have been disconnected). instead of "North is asleep" or "East is stalling." Adding courtesies, as we were taught when we were kids, like "please" and "thank you," make the playing experience much more enjoyable. Playing online with your local club, where you know the players, instead of in the larger anonymous games, can make your experience more pleasant.
